SAFE DRIVING HABITS

AIM HIGH IN STEERING

Key Phrase: Find a safe path well ahead.

Notes: Become a high aim steerer; look as far ahead as you can. Don't look only directly in front of your vehicle while driving.

GET THE BIG PICTURE

Key Phrase: Stay back and see it all.

Notes: Don't rush up behind a line of traffic making you vulnerable to becoming part of an accident if something was to happen. For example, like a beautiful painting, don't get so close that you're not able to see the whole thing, stay back and be able to take it all in.

KEEP YOUR EYES MOVING

Key Phrase: Scan, don't stare.

Notes: Keep eyes moving all around your vehicle; front, rear, sides. Scan from building to building, tree-line to tree-line.

LEAVE YOURSELF AN OUT

Key Phrase: Be prepared, have a plan, expect the unexpected.

Notes: Leave space cushion between you and the vehicle in front of you when stopped at traffic lights or stop signs in case of breakdown or stall.

MAKE SURE THEY SEE YOU

Key Phrase: Don't gamble; use your horn, lights, and signals.

Notes: Establishing eye contact confirms that others see you. Be sure to use horn in a courteous manner to avoid creating a hostile environment.

DPOINT CHERKLIST

1. WHEN STARTING TO MOVE

Look both ways and check your rear view mirrors

- 2. WHEN STOPPED IN TRAFFIC Leave a car length between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you
- 3. COUNT 1...,2...,3... After vehicle ahead has started to move – this is a safe following distance and a clear view if an other vehicle runs a red light

4. FOLLOWING DISTANCE

Four to six seconds following time for speeds under 30 mph; 6-8 seconds for speeds 30 mph and greater

5. 15 SEC EYE LEAD TIME

This is the best way to keep your eyes ahead of your wheel.

- 6. SCAN LOOK FOR SIGNS OF LIFE Such as brake lights, reverse lights, exhaust, and heads behind steering wheels
- 7. STALE GREEN LIGHTS

Are traffic lights that you did not see turn green or a light that you are aware could change at any time

8. EYE CONTACT

Helps other drivers act predictable. When eye contact is not possible, use horn and lights to communicate.

9. PULL FROM CURB

Always look over your shoulder and do not rely strictly on mirrors

10.USE OF MIRRORS

Rule of thumb is to look at mirrors every 5 to 8 seconds

IMMEDIATLY FOLLOWING A LOG TRUCK ACCIDENT.....

<u>D0</u>

- Call your employer and let them know about the accident
- •Take pictures of the vehicles, the placement in the road, and any vehicle damage
- •Wait for your company to tell you where to go and how to get there
- Listen to police and be respectful
- Follow company instructions about drug testing
- Seek medical treatment if necessary
- Speak with counsel about the accident
- •Be honest with counsel
- Listen to your doctors

DON'T

- Give a statement to anyone, including the police, unless specifically told to do so by counsel
- Take pictures of injured or dead people
- •Turn off you vehicle or move, unless directed to do so by the police
- •Leave the scene unless released by police
- •Take any drugs (recreational or otherwise) or drink any alcohol before being drug tested, unless otherwise directed by a doctor
